
Social Studies 7 Course Outline



OVERVIEW:

<u>Social Studies 7</u> focuses on the disciplines of Civics, Economics, Geography, and History in the Maritimes from 1820-1920. An **inquiry-based approach** will take learners beyond the facts and figures, to a deeper understanding of what it means to be a "Maritimer." Before we begin, the students will revisit their knowledge of basic Canadian and Maritime geography.

Key Social Studies Skills in Grade 7 include:

- Perspectives and Experiences of Others
- Critical Thinking, and
- Communication of ideas


SCHEDULE:

Students will have Social Studies 5 times in a two-week cycle.

OUTCOMES:

- 1. Learners will reflect on the impact of government policies and the denial of treaty rights on Mi'kmaw communities and individuals in Mi'kma'ki
- 2. Learners will reflect on historical opportunities and challenges in the Maritimes, inclusive of the Mi'kmaq, Acadians, African Nova Scotians, and Gaels
- 3. Learners will evaluate the impacts of political changes in the Maritimes up to the early 20th century (Confederation)
- 4. Learners will create a response to changing societal conditions in the Maritimes
- 5. Learners will evaluate the impacts of World War I on the Maritimes
- 6. Learners will create responses to opportunities and challenges in present-day Maritime communities

STUDENT ASSESSMENT AND EVALUATION:

Students will be assessed in various ways, including a **portfolio** ("Social Studies Journal"), creative projects, classroom presentations, small and whole-group conversations, and student-teacher conferences. We will use **Google Classroom** sometimes, but please note: material in the Google Classroom *does not* represent the full course. You can check your child's real-time attendance, marks, and assessment schedule using the <u>PowerSchool Parent Portal</u>. If a student has missed time, they should contact me personally to catch up.
